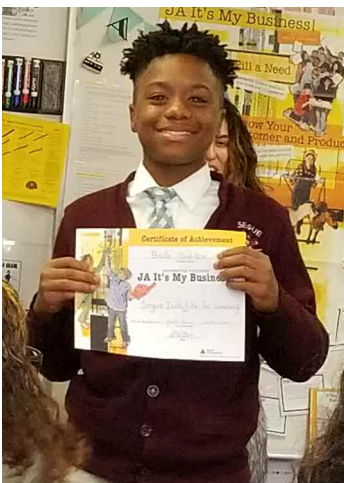

THE CHAMPLIN FOUNDATION

Dear Friends,

2018 was a landmark year at The Champlin Foundation. We navigated significant changes in the foundation's leadership, deployed a higher grants budget (thanks to an unusual bequest), and moved towards modernizing our operations. True to our 86-year history, we remain singularly committed to nourishing relationships with the nonprofit organizations that are vital to the people of Rhode Island.

As newly elected Chairman of the Distribution Committee and newly hired Executive Director, we are honored to follow in the footsteps of Chairman John Gorham and Executive Director Keith Lang. In a year of transitions, the Foundation also welcomed new Distribution Committee members John Muggeridge and Linda Newton.

From its inception, Champlin has supported the breadth of nonprofits that touch all of Rhode Island. Embodying our founders' call to "help the helpless and give hope to the hopeless," our 2018 grants list reflects the diverse needs of our communities, the complexity of peoples' lives, and the strength of the state's nonprofit leadership.

The foundation's unusual grantmaking profile last year was shaped by a significant bequest from the Estate of Eleanor F. Barlow. The Distribution Committee recognized the need for a greater payout than its required minimum distribution and, as a direct result of guidance within the bequest, made extraordinary grants to the University of Rhode Island for nursing school scholarships and to the Boys and Girls Club of Pawtucket and its Camp Ramsbottom, and transferred the value of donated land to the Westerly Land Trust.

Through these remarkable circumstances, Champlin continued to support hundreds of nonprofits in fulfilling their missions. From \$9,000 to Providence's Community Boating Center for paddleboards to \$742,000 to Kent Hospital for state of the art diagnostic equipment, our aim is to equip organizations for success in every sense.

As we turn to the future, we are adopting new grants management technology and learning from our grant recipients about our strengths and shortcomings. We are prepared and eager to continue the proud legacy of The Champlin Foundation.

A Legacy of Stewardship and Impact Keith H. Lang

After eighteen years of dedicated service Keith Lang retired as Executive Director of The Champlin Foundation in June. True to his Scottish roots, Keith's quiet, prudent and efficient leadership led to several landmark accomplishments for The Champlin Foundation and Rhode Island.

Keith led the Foundation to play a leadership role in funding land preservation, including numerous key tracts of land in Block Island, South County and Little Compton. His passion for the environment was well matched to Champlin's understanding of how critical our natural resources are to many of the state's most significant economic drivers: tourism and commercial and recreational boating.

Keith also understood the importance of supporting our largest not for profit institutions, all the while never losing sight of the small charities whether a tiny rural library or grassroots service provider. Organizationally, Keith also helped to shepherd the consolidation of the three Champlin Foundations into one.

Keith Lang guided The Champlin Foundation with integrity enabling quiet, highly effective philanthropy in service to the people and organizations of Rhode Island.



AT A GLANCE



ANIMAL WELFARE

While this category remained by far the smallest on a percentage basis, this does not diminish the impact made through support of long time grantees such as the **Rhode Island Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RISPCA)** and the **Providence Animal Rescue League**, but this year presented the opportunity to fund two new grantees as well.

West Place Animal Sanctuary is a little different than other organizations in this category that typically care for dogs and cats as this organization attends to the needs of injured wildlife or farm animals that have been abused or neglected, helping them find care and refuge on this farm in Tiverton. Funding provided will renovate a small building on site to provide a dog kennel and space for school education programs.

Rhode Island Companion Animal Alliance is the joint creation of RISPCA and the Professional Association of Rhode Island Veterinarians providing a wide array of services to pets of low income owners. Funding of radiography equipment will allow for better pet dental care by being able to properly examine for potential infections and disease. It should be noted that the foundation supported the startup of a veterinary technician program at New England Institute for Technology through a 2012 grant and students currently in that program are now doing internships at this organization gaining valuable experience in a clinical setting.

ARTS & CULTURE

There is much depth and breadth within the fifteen grants in this category, which range from \$9,280 to \$150,000. Close consideration was given to applicants who had been awarded Rhode Island State Council on the Arts (RISCA) grants that require matching funds be raised. These presented unique opportunities not only to help grantees meet this requirement but also to leverage Champlin funds with public dollars.

Though in existence for twenty years, **Teatro ECAS** submitted an initial application this year. Operating out of a space on the South Side of Providence, this is the largest Spanish language theatre in New England and draws on an audience which reflects that reach. A first time grant will allow them to address needs for new ADA compliant doors as well as provide equipment necessary to simulcast performances in English as a means of expanding their audience.

While certainly not a first time grantee, **Trinity Repertory Company** did present the foundation with something different to consider this year – housing for its interns. Whereas the history of support to Trinity had always been focused on the needs of its theatre buildings, a strong case was made that the ability to offer housing has been critical to attracting the best intern candidates. After years of paying rent to house these essential contributors to the work of the theatre, this year's grant will help with the purchase of a more affordable multi-unit intern house within walking distance of the theater itself.

CONSERVATION & PARKS

In 2018 The Champlin Foundation continued its long commitment to conservation of open space in partnership with The Nature Conservancy and others in a major acquisition in Cumberland.

Known as **Mercy Woods** this 243 acre property was acquired at a cost of \$1,500,000, partially funded through a \$295,000 grant. This is the second largest open space purchase in Cumberland's history and will provide public access to hiking trails, 17.5 acres for new ballfields, and additional protection of the Diamond Hill Reservoir watershed.

Another grant of note in this category is to **Borders Farm, Inc.**, a living museum in Foster reflecting farming in the early 20th century. A grant of \$85,500 will fund historic barn restoration and new fencing for the herd of cattle grazing on this two hundred acre landscape that was preserved with the help of the foundation in 2003.

EDUCATION

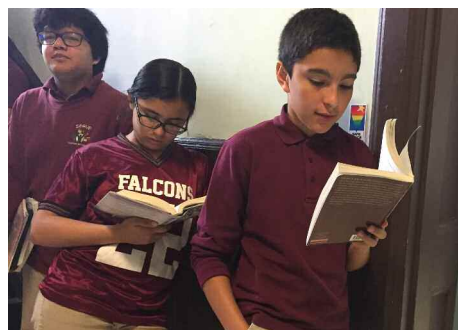
As is the case annually, support of educational institutions and organizations was spread across a broad spectrum as reflected in the twenty-six grants this year. While many have been multiple time past grantees, two were introduced this year as first timers.

Block Island Maritime Institute provides educational programs in aquaculture and marine science as well as maritime activities for children seven days a week in the summer months. Upwards of 1,000 children participate annually. These include those in the Dolphin Program, a one week stay for groups of ten students with two teachers offered to urban high schools in the Northeast. Participating during the summer of 2018 were students from the College Crusade program in Providence and Central Falls High School was a 2017 participant. A first time grant will provide funding to construct additional assembly space in support of these educational programs.

The **Segue Institute for Learning** is a ten year old charter school in Central Falls serving 240 students in grades 6-8. It not only serves as a school for its students but also as a hub for the delivery of social services and support to their families. Open seven days a week, it offers community meeting space, a library, kitchen area, adult education programs, a food pantry and a gymnasium. This accessibility reflects the school philosophy that “empowered and invested families grow stronger children”. A first time grant will provide for the furnishing and equipping of two new science laboratories at the school.

HEALTHCARE

Access to quality healthcare for underserved areas is again addressed this year through grants to Rhode Island Free Clinic in the Olneyville section of Providence and Blackstone Valley Community Health Care for its new community health center in Central Falls.

Support of **Rhode Island Free Clinic** dates back to 2001 and over time we have watched the remarkable growth of this organization. As evidence of this growth, a grant in 2007 paid for the construction of seven exam rooms and this year's grant will provide three more. In the interim, Champlin provided support to establish a dental clinic as well.

Blackstone Valley Community Health Care has under construction in Central Falls a new three story facility bringing under one roof urgent, primary, dental and mental health care as well as pharmacy services to be provided by CVS and laboratory services provided by Lifespan. In a long struggling city with a lack of other options, this facility will provide one stop healthcare with an expected number of patients served to reach 30,000.





HISTORIC PRESERVATION

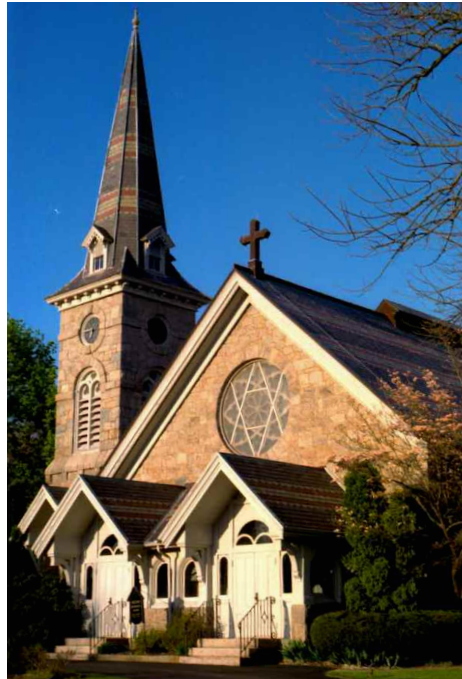
Grants within this category were spread across a remarkable nineteen cities and towns and included new as well as past grantees.

The **Friends of Hearthsides** own historic properties and spectacular farmland all open to the public as part of its Great Road Heritage Campus in Lincoln. One of these is the Moffett Mill (c.1812) which is not only a historic structure but is especially unique in that upon its closure in 1900, the doors were simply locked leaving everything in place and it remains that way today. A first time grant in support of this building will provide for window restoration.

Three new grantees were among recipients under our program for houses of worship. These are the **First Universalist Church of Burrillville** in the village of Harrisville, **Peace Dale Congregational Church** and **United Congregational Church in Little Compton**. All are not only historic but prominent buildings within the respective landscapes/streetscapes and all provide outreach in one form or another to their larger communities.

LIBRARIES

Libraries remained a top category with virtually every one benefitting either through direct capital grants, inclusion within the comprehensive technology grant to **Ocean State Libraries** (OSL) for the consortium of libraries, or both.

Major capital grants included to the **William H. Hall Free Library** in the Edgewood section of Cranston for comprehensive renovation of the lower level of the building; **Providence Community Library** (PCL) for continuing renovation of the **Knight Memorial Library** in the Elmwood section of Providence; and **Providence Public Library** (PPL) towards the cost of renovations to dramatically transform the floorplan to enhance the delivery of patron services.

SOCIAL SERVICES

Support of well-established organizations in the social services category across Rhode Island continued this year that included **Amos House, Child & Family, Community Care Alliance, Comprehensive Community Action Program, Crossroads, Dorcas International, The Kent Center** and the **Rhode Island Community Food Bank** among others as 2018 grantees.

Beyond these, first time grants to the **African Alliance of Rhode Island** will fund a greenhouse to allow for the expansion of their community gardening program at Snake Den Farm in Johnston and to the **MS Dream Center** in Cranston, an organization providing direct services and programs free of charge to people afflicted with Multiple Sclerosis. Funding for the MS Dream Center will provide new doors to enhance access within the center for participants.

YOUTH SERVICES

The foundation remains steadfast in its funding of youth service organizations, some with grant histories dating back to the time of Mr. Champlin himself. While some of the grants may appear quite routine, each are vitally important to insure the facilities in which programs and services are provided to our young people are safe, sound and well equipped.

However, beyond these basic infrastructure type grants, funding for new programs at **Community Boating Center** in Providence for stand-up paddleboards supports the expansion of its offerings to youth beyond sailing and kayaking as well as a grant to the **Boys & Girls Clubs of Warwick** that will provide the necessary equipment to introduce STEM programs at its Norwood and Oakland Beach facilities.

Also, within this category it is worth noting the Champlin campership program continued for its 28th year providing funds annually so that children in need have the opportunity to attend summer camp. Summer camps operated by twenty-six organizations received funds for this purpose including two new participants being the **Episcopal Conference Center** in Pascoag and the **Irons Homestead-United Church of Christ** in Glocester.

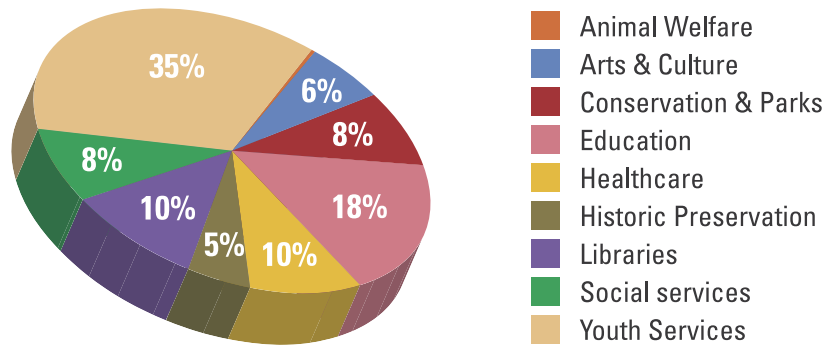

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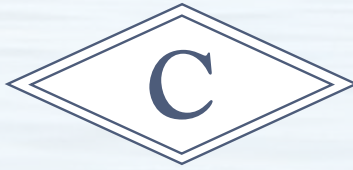
