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Dear Friends,

2019 was a year of tradition and transformation at The Champlin Foundation. Most importantly, the Foundation issued more than 220 grants totaling \$18.6 million. Thirty-one organizations received grants for the first time or the first time in a long time. We accelerated innovations in our grantmaking operations and sought to better understand the impact of our work and how it might be improved.

Since its founding, The Champlin Foundation has upheld George Champlin and his sisters' call to "help the helpless and give hope to the hopeless." Our 2019 grants list once again reflects the needs in our community and the inspiring leadership of Rhode Island's nonprofits. Our grants support a diverse range of organizations that focus on community health, youth services and education, social services, historic preservation, conservation, arts and culture, and animal welfare. In addition, our 2019 grantmaking reaffirmed our longstanding support for the state's libraries.

For over eight decades, The Champlin Foundation has provided grants to Rhode Island nonprofits to support capital needs. The range of projects, equipment and organizations receiving grants is always diverse, and this year was no different. Our support ranged from a \$250,000 grant toward the acquisition of a new building for the Jonnycake Center of Peace Dale to expand its essential safety net services to a \$10,680 grant to Project Undercover for security and other technology equipment at its donation center to a \$102,000 grant to fund The Public's Radio's creation of news studios in Newport and Westerly.

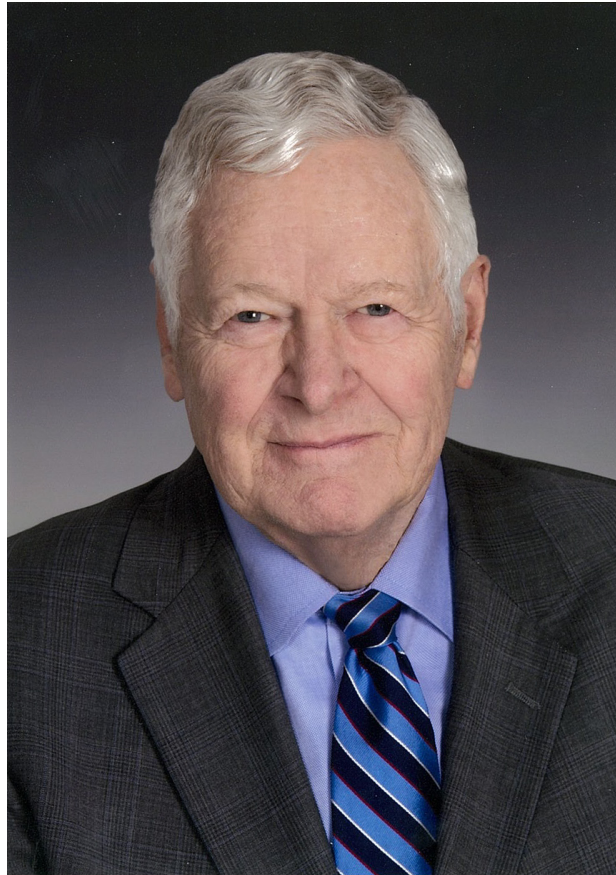
We have also taken significant measures in the last year to modernize the Foundation's operations. We engaged the Center for Effective Philanthropy to undertake a Grantee Perception Study, the results of which offered valuable insights and affirmed the foundation's impact. We've moved our application submission online and streamlined the process for applicants to respond to inquiries and provide additional information. In 2019, our staff and Committee Members conducted more than 100 site visits to better understand the applicant organizations and projects we consider. These efforts to improve and streamline our work now allow us to move from a once a year grant cycle to two application cycles per year starting in 2021, shortening the time between submission and decision.

We are mindful that we are publishing this 2019 report during a time of crisis. The COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent economic crisis has impacted all aspects of our community and places an extraordinary strain on the agencies the Foundation supports. As we have during other times of crisis, The Champlin Foundation has taken measures to support Rhode Island's nonprofits in their service to our residents, including a commitment of more than \$2.6 million in repurposed or new funding.

We are proud to have the opportunity to preserve the Champlin Family's legacy and stand with Rhode Island's nonprofit and charitable community.

Animal Welfare

Originally founded in the 1970's as the East Greenwich Animal Protection League, this first time grantee purchased a building in Cranston in 2017 providing a permanent home for the organization. Opening its doors on February 1, 2018, in this brief time they have already handled the adoption of 900 pets. This year's grant will help construct the outside infrastructure of the dog area which will be welcomed by our friends like Hugo pictured here.

Recognizing that animals can be among those in need, Champlin provides critical support to bellwether welfare organizations such as **Rhode Island Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RISPCA)**, **The Potter League** and the **Providence Animal Rescue League**. Also included was a second grant to a first time grantee last year, the **Rhode Island Companion Animal Alliance**, a collaboration of RISPCA and the Professional Association of RI Veterinarians, providing free care to the pets of low income people, as well as support to a first time grantee this year being the **Heart of Rhode Island Animal Rescue League**.

Arts & Culture

The Wilbury Theatre Group operating out of the Olneyville section of Providence was among the first time grantees in 2019 and the Champlin grant combined with other donors will allow for technical upgrades to enhance the performance space and the audience experience.

Arts & Culture handily eclipses the million dollar mark this year in a category that is broad spanning theater, music, and art organizations. While most of the names are familiar as past grantees, there are six new grantees within the category being **Bristol Theatre Company**, **Narragansett Bay Symphony Community Orchestra**, **Newport Music Festival** and **The Wilbury Theatre Group**. Grants in this category will help complete multi-year projects for **AS220**, the **Steel Yard**, and the **Common Fence Point Improvement Association**, which transformed a tired community center into a vibrant arts center. Champlin embraced their vision early on with a first grant in 2014 that was used to leverage over \$700,000 from public and private sources.

Conservation & Parks

Providing opportunities for people to connect with natural landscapes has been an enduring goal of the foundation through its funding in this category. The Land Conservancy of North Kingston raised 50% of the necessary funds within its community that a Champlin grant will match to construct a footbridge across a stunning marshland in Wickford allowing two existing trail systems on either side to become one.

Support of **The Nature Conservancy** continued with partial funding of land acquisition in the Worden's Pond area of South Kingstown as well as continued enhanced stewardship of three flagship preserves in Charlestown, Saunderstown and West Greenwich, two of which were Champlin legacy projects.

First time grantees within the category include **The Land Conservancy of North Kingstown** and **Revive the Roots**, a small, grassroots organization operating a community farm in Smithfield in collaboration with the local land trust.

Education

The Champlin Foundation was a major donor when the Meeting Street National Center of Excellence opened its doors in the early 2000's educating children of all abilities through the power of inclusion. Now in support of its ongoing expansion, the foundation with a grant of \$500,000 coupled with grants in each of the two previous years, will have donated \$1,000,000 towards this current project.

Education, perennially a top category, includes support of public and private secondary and higher education as well as vocational (**New England Institute of Technology and International Yacht Restoration School**) and special education **Meeting Street**. The largest grant within the category is to the **University of Rhode Island**.

Of particular note, funding of secondary education, both public and independent, includes grants supporting engineering, physical education/fitness and interdisciplinary (STEAM) as well as to expand two new career pathways programs at **Johnston High School** (materials processing) and **Ponagansett High School** (construction/building trades) in support of non-college bound students. These grants highlight a foundation goal of supporting a variety of curriculum as well as a geographic/demographic mix of schools in secondary education.

Healthcare

Construction of this state of the art health center was completed in 2019 with the help of a Champlin grant at the beginning of construction as well as at the end. This facility provides comprehensive medical, pharmacy and mental health services under one roof and is expected to serve upwards of 16,000 patients by 2021. Total Champlin investment in the project was \$513,875.

Healthcare is the top category this year by a relatively wide margin. Grants in this category tend to be large and include support of major hospitals, nursing facilities, and community health centers as well as the **Rhode Island Blood Center**.

This foundation has a long history of supporting community health organizations statewide and this year we have provided major support in the opening of three new facilities being a satellite health center in Westerly by **Wood River Health Services**, the **Rhode Island Public Health Institute's** "LGBTQ Center for Clinical Excellence" health center in Providence, and a health center in Olneyville being developed by **Providence Community Health Centers**. In addition, support continued for the recently opened health center of **Blackstone Valley Community Health Care**. Clearly, these new additions to Rhode Island speak to the demand that exists to expand capacity in community health.

Historic Preservation

This organization took ownership and began renovation of the long endangered historic property known as The Wedding Cake House prominently located on Broadway in Providence in 2017. Champlin was an early investor in this monumental task with a grant in 2017 to get them started and again this year to help them move to the finish line. Total investment by Champlin to date is \$298,950.

Historic Preservation grants this year will help complete a couple of previously funded major projects as well as provide some first-time grants.

By providing additional grants this year to **Dirt Palace Public Projects** and for the Varnum Armory in East Greenwich where the **Varnum Continentals** as owners of the building have been engaged in an ongoing effort supported by Champlin to make it structurally sound and weather tight, both organizations should be well on their way to completion of major multi-year projects.

Grants under our Houses of Worship program again reflect a spread across denominations and geography and we are pleased to have four new grantees among the seven overall being **Bell Street Chapel** (Providence), **Church of the Ascension** (Wakefield), **St. Columba's Berkeley Memorial Chapel** (Middletown), and **Zabriskie Memorial Church of St. John the Evangelist** (Newport). All are not only historic, but prominent within the respective landscapes/streetscapes and provide outreach in one form or another to their larger communities.

Libraries

The Providence Public Library is in the midst of what is believed to be the largest library renovation ever undertaken in Rhode Island that when finished will completely reimagine the floor plan consisting of 8,600 square feet. This year Champlin made a second grant to this project of \$750,000 bringing the total foundation investment to \$1,250,000. Upon completion, the renovated space will feature a new Children's Library and a Teen Loft to enhance services to its younger patrons.

Support remains strong in 2019 reflecting the belief there is something for every age and every demographic at a public library whether it be story hours for the youngest patrons, a safe after school option for older children, access to computers for those without their own, a community meeting space or just a quiet place for study. As the late First Lady, Lady Bird Johnson once said, "Perhaps no place in any community is so totally democratic as the town library. The only entrance requirement is interest."

While some of the library grants may appear rather mundane, all play an important role in keeping the facilities better maintained and equipped beyond what annual budgets would otherwise allow. Among these are two that will comprehensively transform well-worn, tired interiors into vibrant new spaces at the **North Kingstown Free Library** and the **Jamestown Philomenian Library** where a combination of public and other private dollars will be leveraged by the foundation's investment in each.

Speaking of transformational, the **Providence Public Library** project is moving towards completion with continued Champlin support.

Social Services

In South Kingstown, a major transformational grant was approved for the Jonnycake Center of Peace Dale, an organization providing food, clothing and social services that is poised to begin renovation of a much larger building acquired this year to alleviate an increasing space shortage at its current location as well as being able to increase services provided.

Grants in the Social Services category increased by over \$1,000,000 from last year. Most of the grantees are familiar names as well-established organizations with long Champlin histories. While most grants reflect the garden variety type capital improvements (roofs, windows, HVAC, parking lots, security systems), two should be highlighted as transformative in terms of growing organizational capacity.

Champlin has been a major supporter of **Rhode Island Legal Services** as a provider of a wide variety of legal representation to the poor dating back to a first grant in 1995. In need of more space to expand services related to housing issues and specifically related to evictions, a grant this year will allow them to purchase an additional floor in the same building they are currently located to advance this goal while reducing staff crowding generally.

As a core provider of a broad array of social services in Woonsocket, Champlin support over the last decade has funded both infrastructure and equipment needs at both of the **Community Care Alliance's** main facilities within the city. This year the funding of a new roof for the Cummings Way building provides an example of the long held recognition by the foundation that in order to deliver important services, an organization needs a sound facility from which to do so.

Youth Services

This bustling Y has a history that dates back to George S. Champlin himself. Mr. Champlin, a Warwick resident, believed that the Kent County youth deserved a YMCA and set forth in acquiring the land in the late 1950's and donating it to the YMCA of Greater Providence for this purpose. The commitment had only begun as he subsequently invested heavily in the build out of the infrastructure throughout the 1960's that makes up the campus today. Over time, the foundation has made major grants to this branch in honoring the vision he set forth in the 1950's including this year's grant of \$375,000 for a new roof.

Once again this category will literally cover the state from Woonsocket to Westerly with grants to every Boys & Girls Club, every YMCA, Boys Scouts and Girl Scouts, and it should be pointed out this is in addition to the \$418,000 distributed to these organizations for camperships earlier in the year. From a capital standpoint, the facilities these organizations operate are heavily used and as a result keeping them well maintained is an ongoing challenge. The foundation has always viewed its ongoing role as helping ensure the facilities are well equipped and with sound infrastructure. A review of this year's grants reflects this, and a prime example is the grant to **YMCA of Greater Providence**.

Included this year are some newcomers as well as some that haven't received support recently. New to the category are **Books Are Wings** promoting youth literacy; **Girls Rock Rhode Island** supporting empowerment through music education; and the **Rhode Island Urban Debate League** that uses academic debate to promote youth development in the urban core schools. Among the latter group is **Button Hole** providing golf opportunities to urban youth, and **Cranston League for Cranston's Future** (CLCF) providing a wide array of non-competitive youth sports for children of all abilities in our host city.

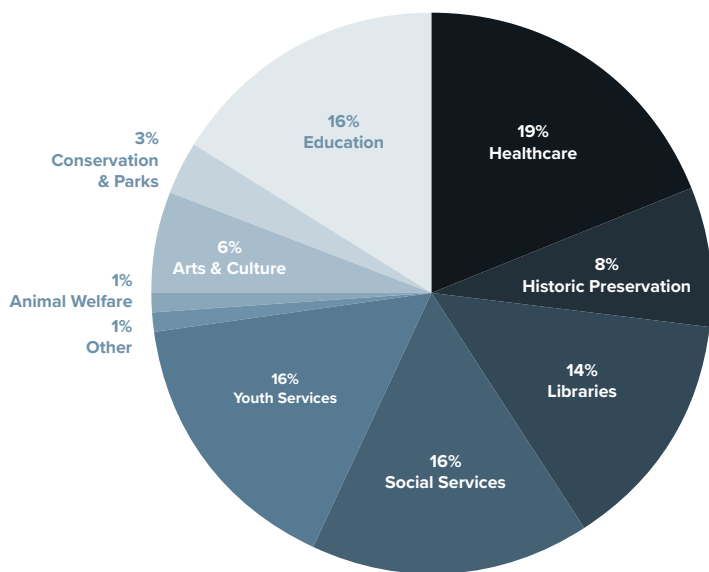
