




## Arts & Culture

## Conservation & Parks

While the Foundation spent many years focused on conserving green space, our work is shifting to making the environment and nature accessible and verdant for more Rhode Islanders. We look to encourage ways in which people can get on the land, experience the wonder of animals and marine life, and support community farming.

Through their Market Mobile platform, Farm Fresh Rhode Island is connecting directly with farmers and consumers, making it easy to source local produce and reduce food waste. Revive the Roots Foundation expanded their existing footprint of ecologically regenerative and dynamic social spaces, thereby increasing the number of people who can advance their goals of creating more sustainable agriculture. Save the Bay, a long-trusted and peerless organization in the Ocean State, continues to grow, evolve and significantly scale up its marine education, inspiring the spirit of conservation to more visitors at its new aquarium

## Education

Learning should be a lifelong journey, and Rhode Island's education landscape offers access at every stage of that journey. From formal classrooms and after-school programming to higher education access and adult career education, these organizations give people of all ages the tools they need to develop new skills and explore new ideas.

A safe environment ensures students can achieve their highest potential. The San Miguel School is improving security and communications with a new intercom and card entry system for their middle school students. Leadership Rhode Island is enhancing meeting space for their professional development trainings. Newport Community School, which will furnish and equip classrooms and meeting space, is an example of the broader continuum. They work with learners of all ages to complement classroom learning and support academic success, personal responsibility, and economic self-sufficiency. DownCity Design, too, is enhancing mechanical systems in their new facility, where they offer a spectrum of programming from after-school graphic design for middle schoolers to professional development for educators.

"I have learned that it is critical to trust your team, to be willing to be vulnerable and lean on each other during challenging times. It took all of us, collectively, to figure out how to offer library services during a public health emergency. We asked questions, shared fears, researched, listened to librarians from around the state and country, experimented with new skills and platforms, made mistakes, challenged ideas, gathered our courage, and kept moving forward—together!"

## Healthcare

The healthcare grantees this year serve every corner of the state, making the physical and mental health of Rhode Islanders their top priority. From Hope Valley and Wakefield to Cumberland and Portsmouth, these organizations expand access to high-quality care and improve the well-being of our communities, despite facing significant ongoing challenges around workforce shortages and burnout of healthcare professionals.

CODAC Behavioral Healthcare is creating a state-of-the-art integrated health center in Providence where patients can work with doctors, nurses, and counselors to take a more holistic approach to their wellness. Women & Infants Hospital, where more than 80 percent of all births in the state take place, is building a new labor and delivery center to add to their already established suite of services and support for expectant families. And in Hope Valley, Wood River Health expanded its facility in order to provide high-quality care to more patients.

"Our biggest lesson has been understanding the substantial impact we can have by frequently engaging with our communities and museum patrons through digital technologies. This goes beyond putting static images on the website or offering Zoom programs. We engage people as stakeholders, regularly sharing the continual work we do for the care of the collection and the facility. Despite the lack of normal tour and event income, we were able to grow our account balances because the public listened, cared, and wanted to help."




# Historic Preservation & Heritage

The important work of protecting and maintaining these historic properties is happening in communities across the state.

Congdon Street Baptist Church in Providence is undergoing exterior restoration, masonry work is underway at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Portsmouth, and the South County History Center in Kingston is replacing the roof and repairing masonry at the Old Washington County Jail.


## Libraries

Libraries are true centers of our communities, offering training and education, a quiet refuge from the chaos of busy schedules, and a public meeting space for debate and collaboration in addition to being a repository of knowledge. Libraries are a place of meaningful connection and exploration.

As people spend an increasing amount of time online and on social media, libraries have proven to be a place of adaptation and innovation. In pursuit of serving more patrons, providing compelling programming, and bringing communities together, libraries across the state continue to invest in their physical spaces. The Jesse M. Smith Memorial Library in Harrisville is enhancing its children's department, the Pawtucket Public Library is conducting exterior masonry repairs, the Davisville Free Library is prioritizing accessibility, while the Maury Loontjens Memorial Library continues its new construction in Narragansett.

"The most important lesson I've learned from the past three years is how essential it is to focus on using an equity lens as we design, implement, and sustain programs. We've learned just how vulnerable our community is to crisis, whether it's the loss of jobs or housing, or the dangers of a pandemic virus. We're asking harder questions of ourselves and our work and listening more deeply. It hasn't been easy, but by becoming a better, stronger organization, we're also helping build a more united and empowered community."

## Social Services

Social services represent the largest share of Champlin funding in 2022, with 45 organizations receiving nearly \$5 million to provide and expand essential services. These nonprofits, led by the devoted champions of our communities, provide the most vulnerable Rhode Islanders with access to food, housing, job training, and more.

Cape Verdean American Community Development, which honors the past, embraces the present, and empowers the future of Rhode Island's robust Cape Verdean community, will make some interior renovations to their building—a beloved space for education and fellowship. A mobile van at **Children's Friend** will enable the agency to go outside the office into the community to increase use of WIC benefits. Women's Refugee Care will also take their services on the road with the use of a passenger van that allows them to better connect with women in the African refugee community.

"The practice of medicine and the future of health care demands for us to be agile, patient-centric, innovative, sophisticated, and inclusive. This requires us to rethink, reinvent, and reimagine where we are and where we are going. We must lead the next generation of health care professionals in a pursuit of self and social awareness, inspiring them to push harder, challenge norms, and empower both themselves and their patients to be agents of change in this ever-changing world."

## Welfare of Animals

The community of nonprofits that serve animals in Rhode Island is small but mighty, and Champlin supported five such organizations this year that are multi-species providers, working regionally.

The purchase of a new van for the **Providence Animal Rescue League** will allow them to respond to emergencies and bring animals to safety, while the **West Place Animal Sanctuary** in Tiverton is putting an addition onto its barn, where they provide sanctuary for horses and farm animals that have suffered from neglect and cruelty and rehabilitate waterfowl and game birds.

"As all nonprofits experienced unprecedented times over the past three years, what emerged as a significant lesson was the importance of the community at large, understanding the Y as a 'cause-driven' organization. This led to immediate donations from members, individuals, and foundations to navigate through these turbulent times, and continue to enable the Y to provide for our mission."



## Youth Services

From new grantees to long-established nonprofits with a deep history of Champlin funding, the organizations receiving support in the youth services category inspire creativity and advance learning and the development of leadership skills in young people around the state. With a workforce shortage crisis looming in Rhode Island and beyond, investing in the next generation talent pipeline and providing early interventions for children who are struggling are particularly important priorities.

The Boys & Girls Clubs provide consistent services and support for youth and families, with projects like the new Woonsocket Clubhouse coming online from the Boys & Girls Club of Northern Rhode Island, and expansion of the Wanskuck Clubhouse from the Boys & Girls Club of Providence. Other innovative and engaging offerings receiving support include the workforce development programs offered by YouthBuild Providence, and a youth wrestling program offered by first-time grantee Beat the Streets New England.

"Of the many lessons Covid taught us, one of the most important has been understanding the power of effective communication. In the world of nonprofits, partnerships are crucial, and we all must evaluate our own assumptions and biases in order to cultivate stronger relationships and maximize collective impact."




